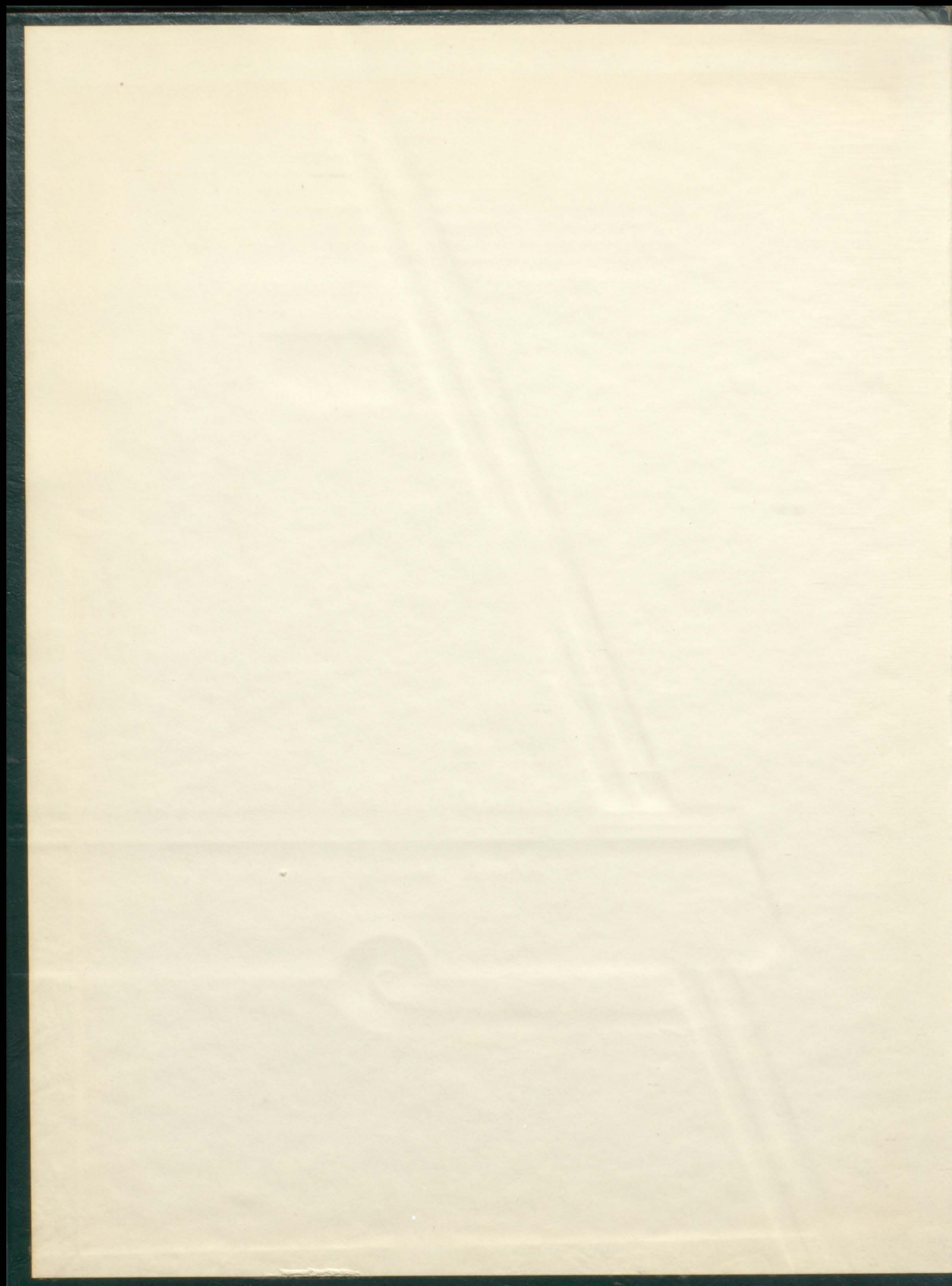
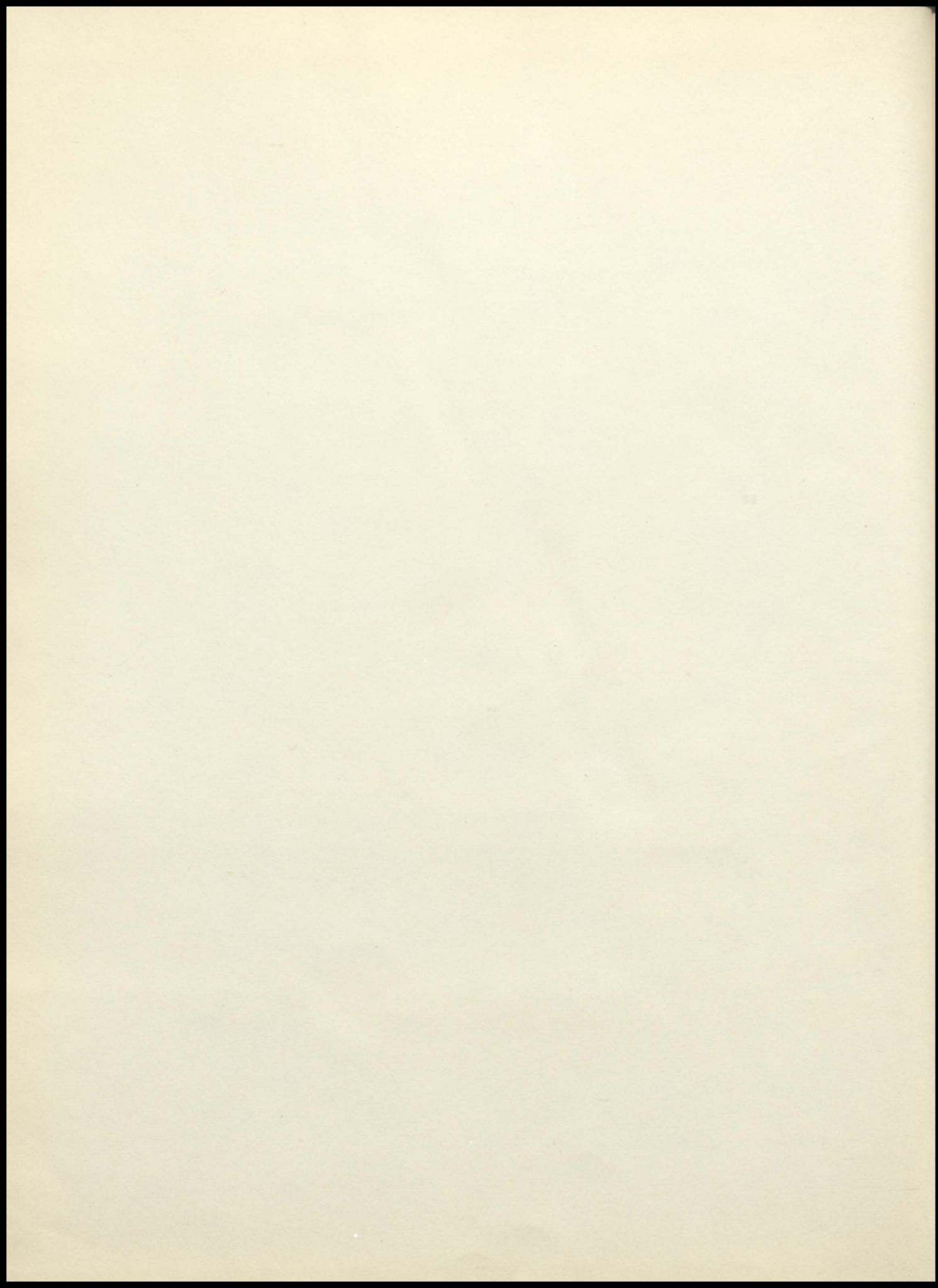

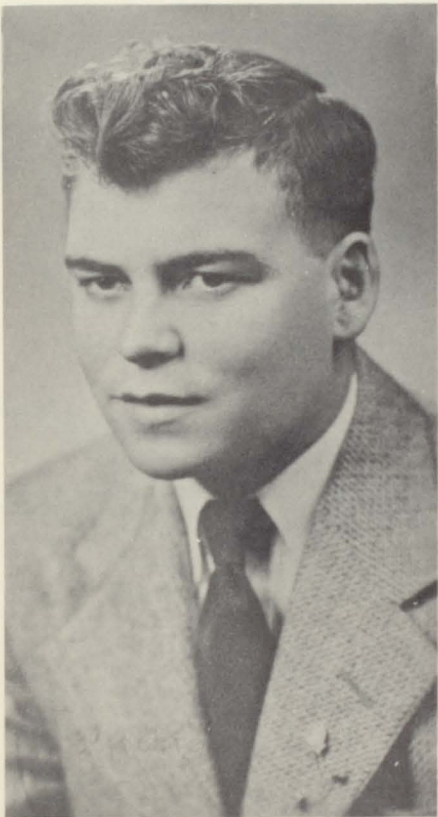

Mr. Duane L. Orth -

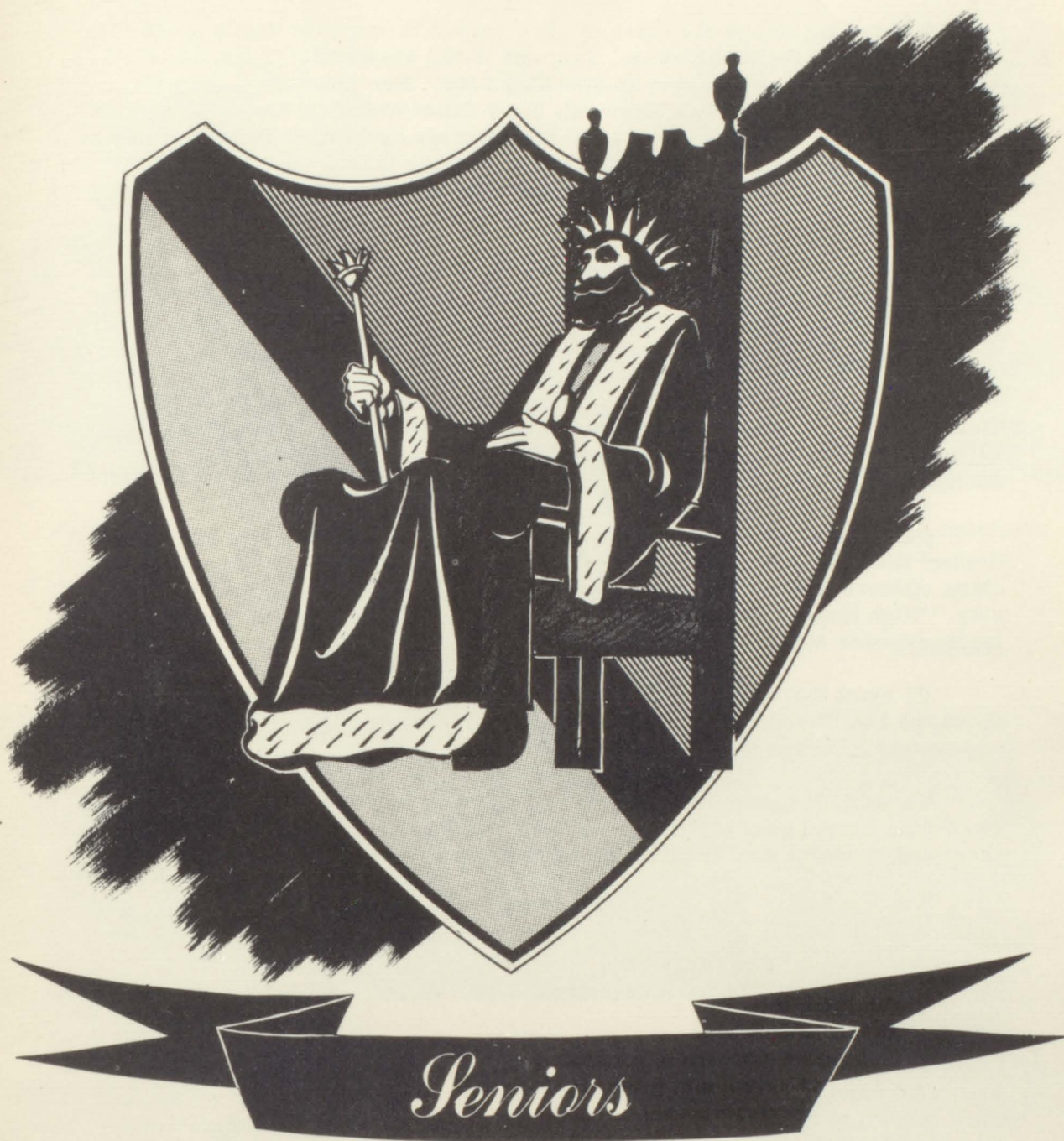

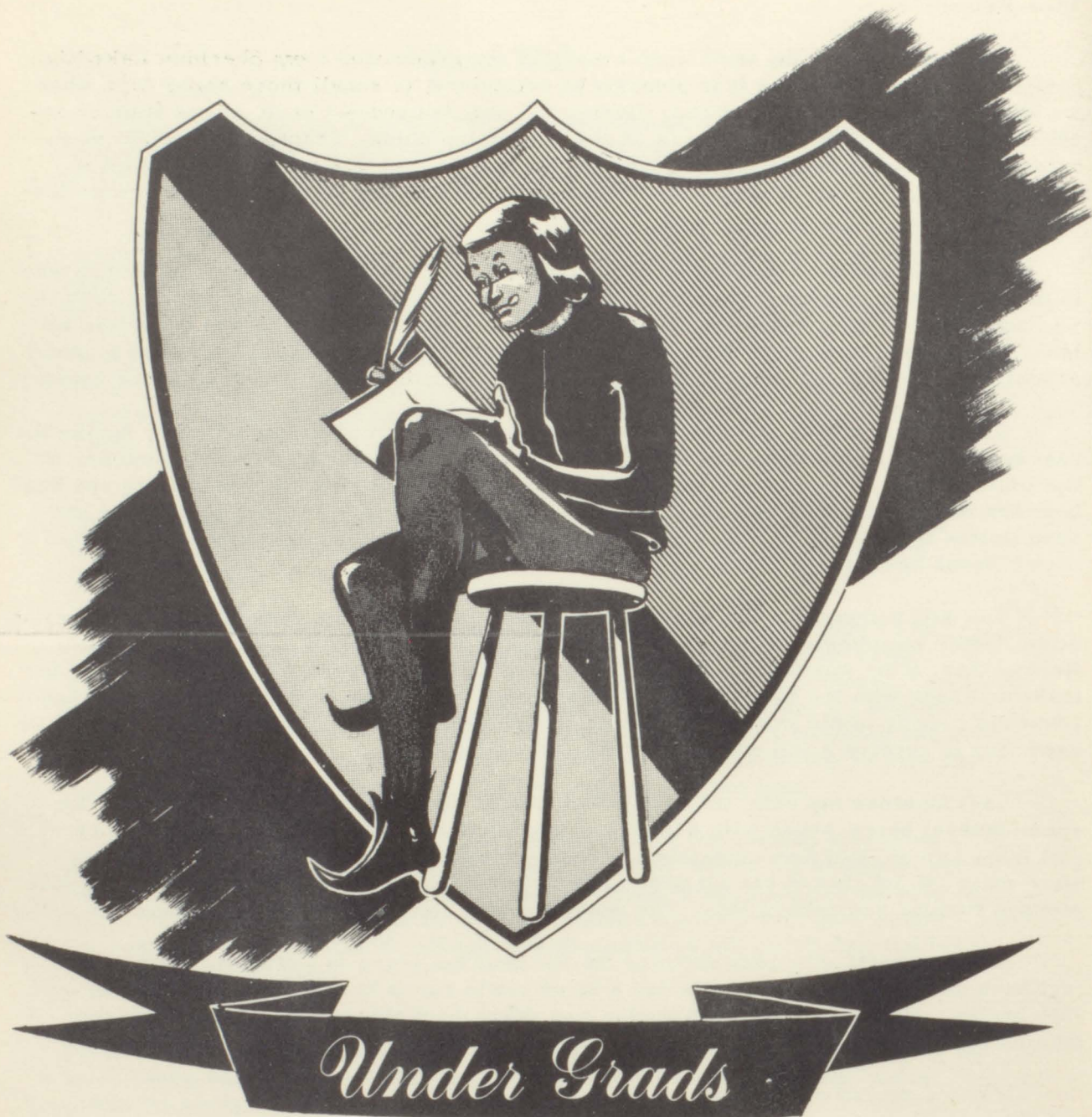

Twenty-three classes are held each day ranging from five to fifteen minutes.

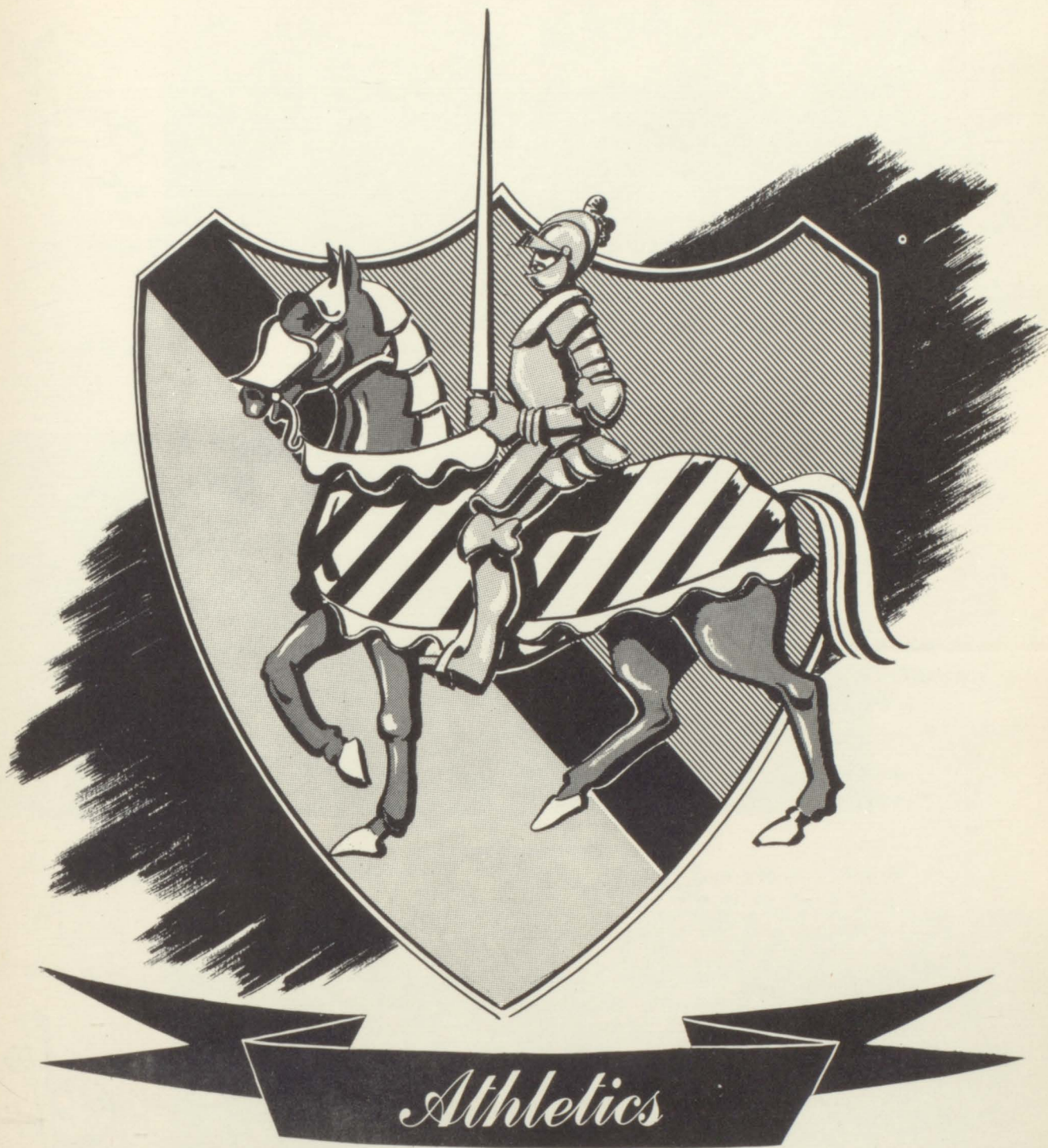
Phonics are taught throughout all three grades. The different subjects taught are spelling, arithmetic, reading, geography, health, English and science.

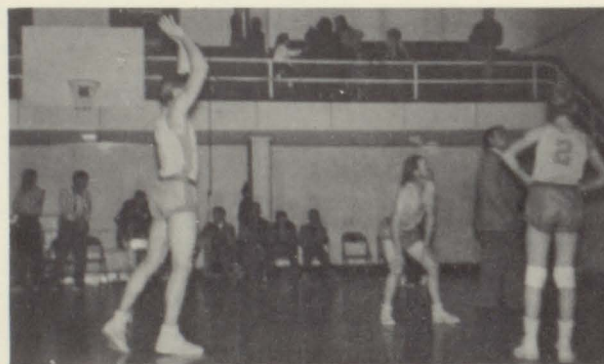

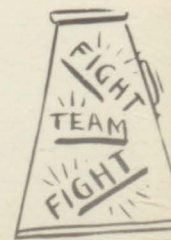
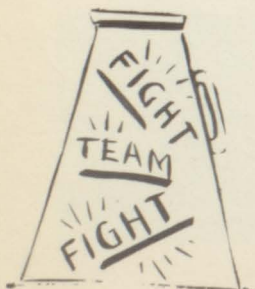

Parent-Teacher Association

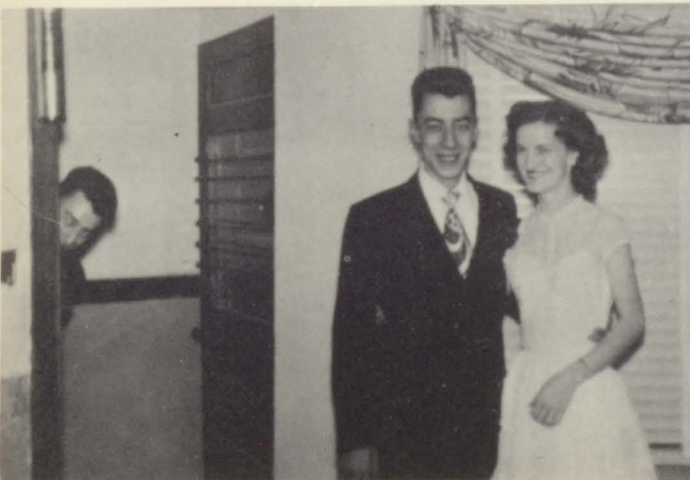
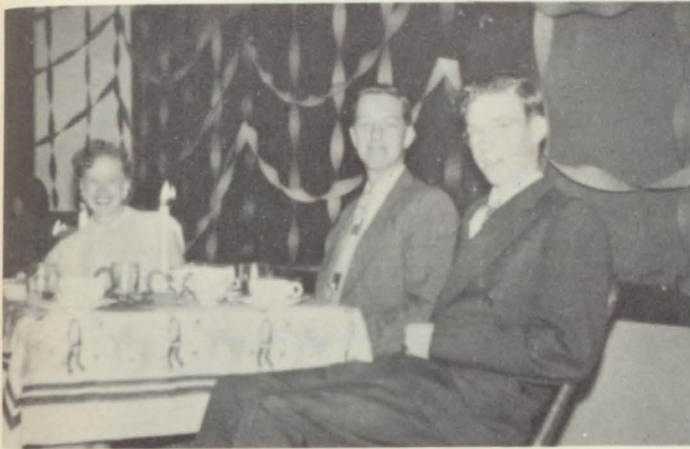
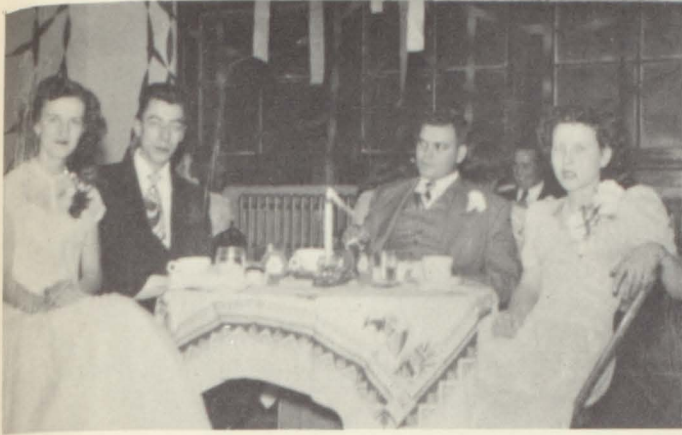
One of the outstanding features of the educational program during the school year, 1950-51, was the establishment and organization of the Sheridan Lake Parent-Teacher Association.

An organizational meeting was held in September, 1950, at which time members were enrolled, officers elected, rules and regulations agreed upon, and plans made for affiliating with the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

All meetings of the group were held in the school building. Programs varied and consisted of musical events, discussions, and various types of educational events.

Perhaps the outstanding educational program of the year was an "open house" which was held in conjunction with the February meeting. A typical school day in miniature was presented and all phases of school life was opened for the observation, criticism, and suggestions of the parents. This event also afforded an opportunity for parents to discuss with the teachers any personal difficulties involving their children regarding school life.

Thus far, the Sheridan Lake Parent-Teacher Association has been an outstanding success. It is hoped that this organization will continue to thrive many more years, and that it will continue to bestow many worth-while benefits upon the children of the Sheridan Lake School.



History of Sheridan Lake, Colorado In Kiowa County

Colorado has long been known as the "Land of Sunshine" with its mild winters and pleasant summers. To the old settlers in Kiowa County, nothing is more apparent than the change in the atmospheric humidity. In their earlier pioneer days, dews and frosts were seldom seen; today it is almost as common as in the more humid states.

Many years back, about forty-three years, Sheridan Lake was a big resort town. There was a big lake with a hotel and all the facilities. People came for miles around to regain their health.

At that time, land was being homesteaded. The county seat was at Sheridan Lake. Eads wanted this county seat real bad, so they put it to a vote a few times. Sheridan Lake won every time. One night a few of the Eads officers came over on a flat car, after the courthouse was burned down and took the vault and all the papers. Sheridan Lake didn't want any blood shed so they just gave in, and now Eads still has the county seat.

The first officers in the courthouse were: Ramond Miller, H. A. Long, J. H. Booker, Arther Standard, Mr. Birch and Judge Allen.

At that time the population was about four or five hundred.

A few years later the population was one-hundred. Cattle and wheat were the following occupations occurred; H. K. Albright, livestock; W. H. Sheridan Lake is located on the main line of the Missouri Pacific Railway, fourteen miles from the Kansas line. It is prospering and growing rapidly.

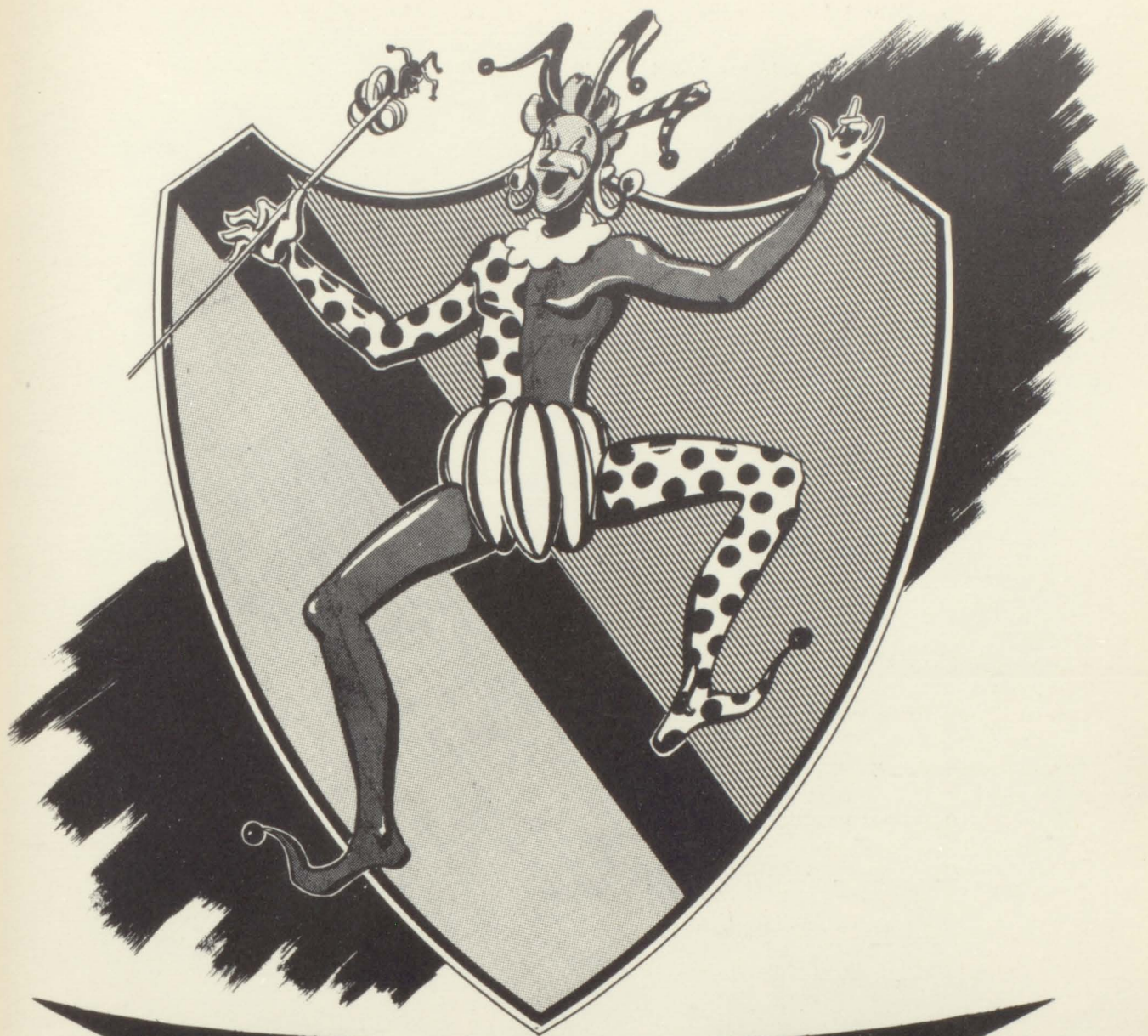
Kiowa County, Colorado, is located in the eastern part of the state, extending from the Kansas state line westward eighty miles. Its width from north to south is twenty-four miles.

The Missouri Pacific Railway enters the county at the east line and extends westward through the center of the county to the west line and on to Pueblo.

The surface varies from a level to a slightly undulating plain which is traversed from north to south by three streams -- Big Sandy, Rush Creek, and Adobe Creek.

An abundance of sheet water is found along the streams at a depth of four to twenty feet. This water can be used for irrigation, if desired, as the quantity is practically inexhaustible.

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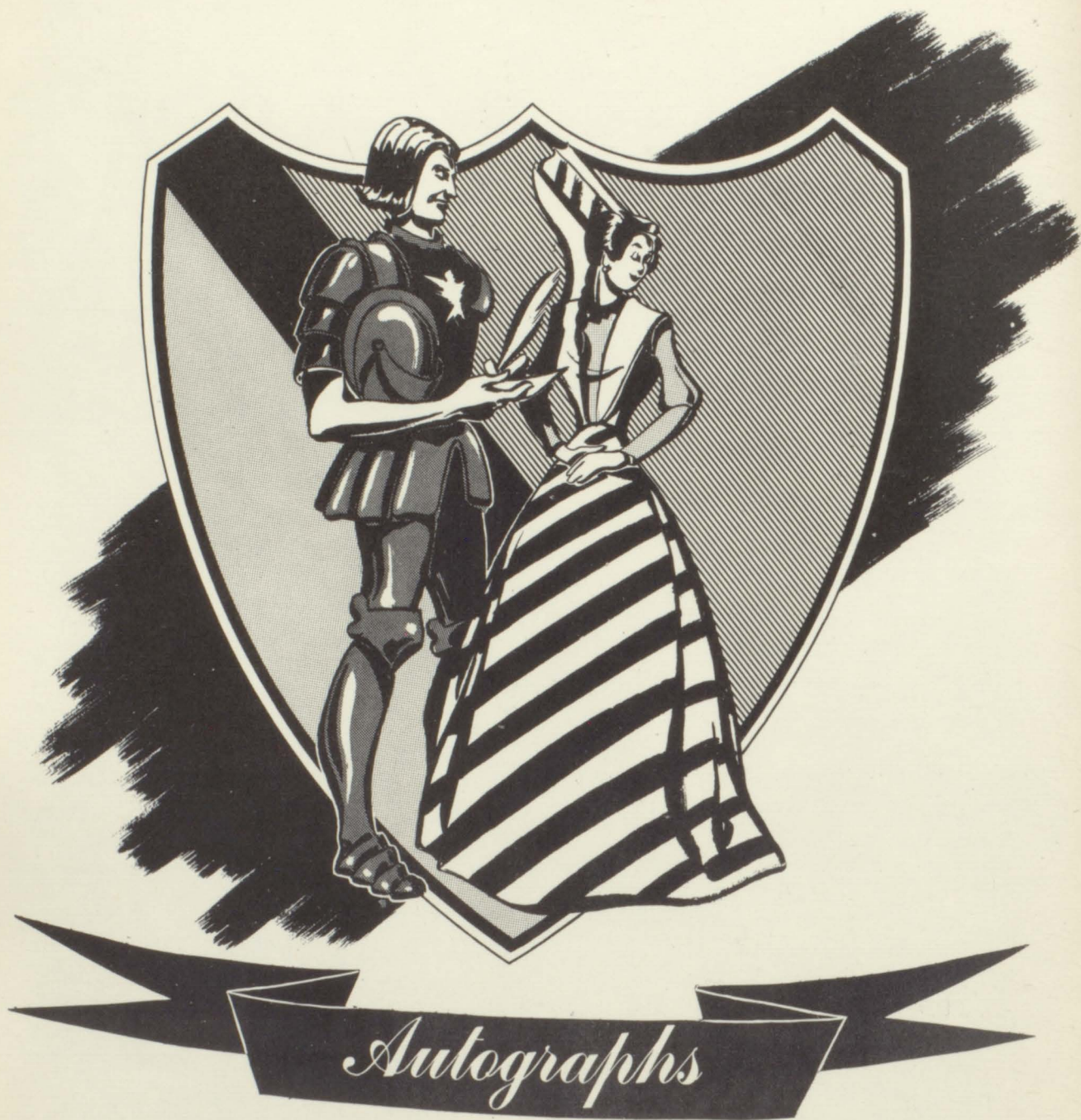
