Graduation for the class of 1951 is drawing near, and I want to express my congratulations to each member. It has taken some determination to remain in school twelve years, but who should do less in these times?


It is my hope that many of you will continue formal education in other schools and colleges. Education is very essential in democracy and especially in these trying times.

On the gum-machine it read, "Brabbs Tripple Bubble Gum". It also gave the address so when this man fixed her tire she was going to see him.


