A concert was presented at the high school February 26. Band members have taken part in many school and community programs.

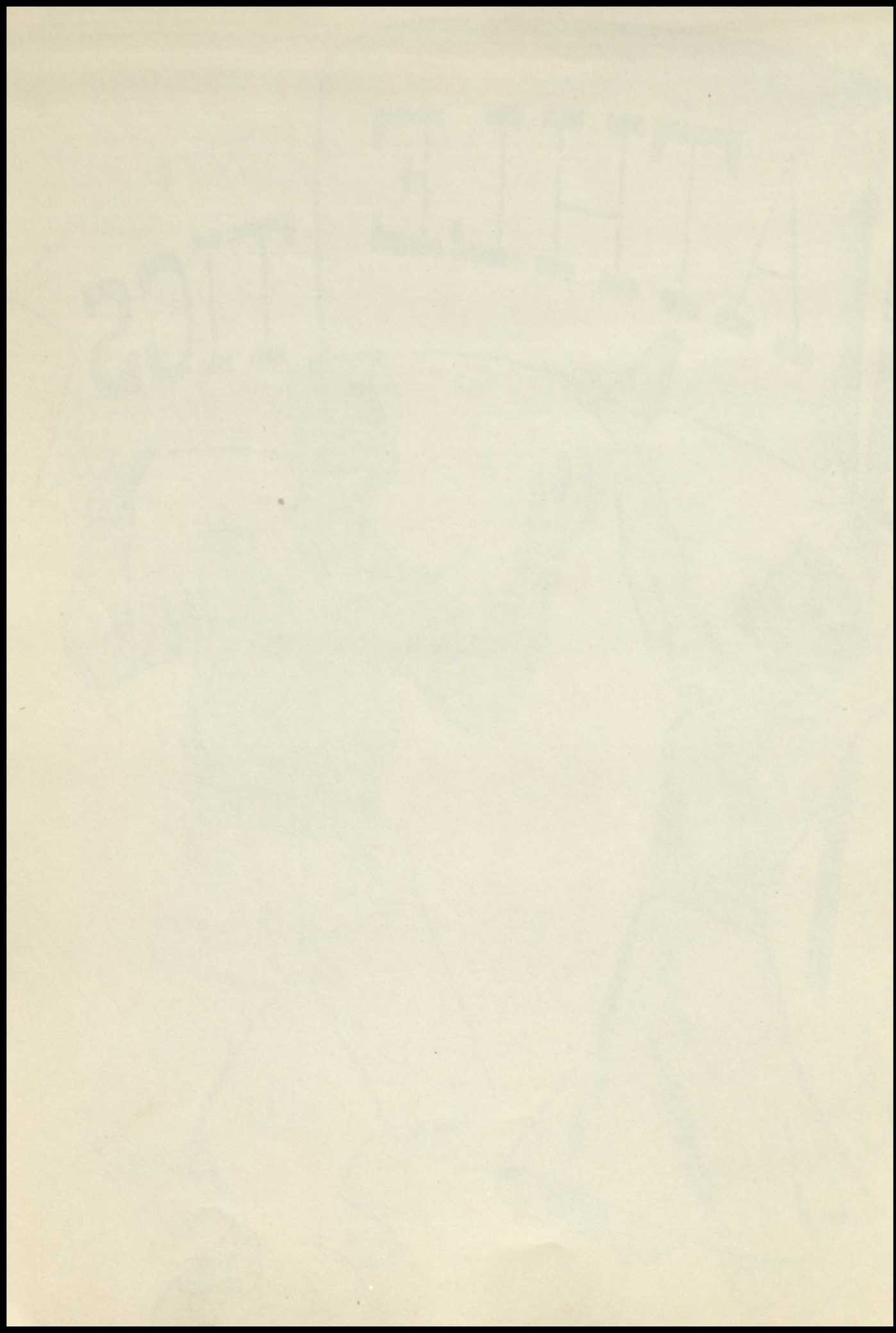

Bennie Snell entered our sixth grade class. He left at the end of the year. Mrs. B. E. Warrington was our teacher.

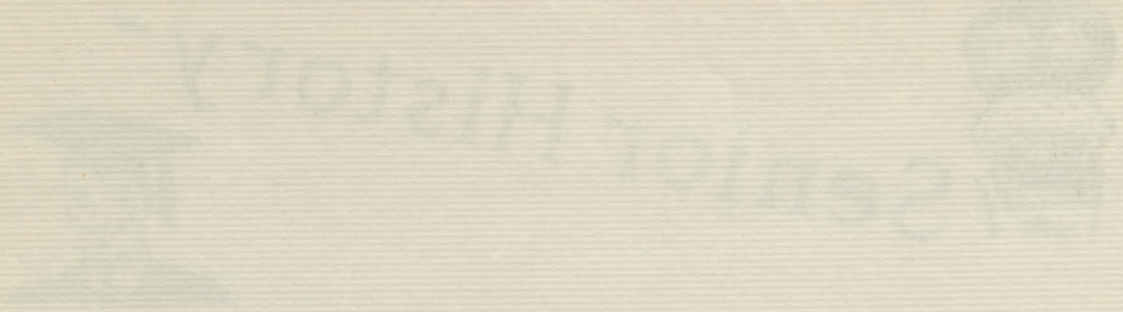

The Intermediate Grades in Work and Fun at School

In this study they are learning how people work and live, of commerce and transportation within and between countries, of natural resources, and comparisons and contrast of the various peoples of these countries, and the comparison and contrasts of the countries themselves. They read aloud from their geography textbooks with a view of improving their reading. Questions and discussions, then follow.

Our room has had a number of parties this term, one in observance of each holiday, some birthday parties, and farewell parties. The outstanding and most appreciated of all was the farewell party, which was planned, prepared, and given by Richard Humburg and Duane Patterson in honor of Dennis Montgomery.

Basketball season is about over. The boys have participated in games with several towns and have been victorious in the greater per cent of the games played. They are to play in a tournament at Coolidge, Kansas. We certainly hope they win the victory there. Good luck, Boys!

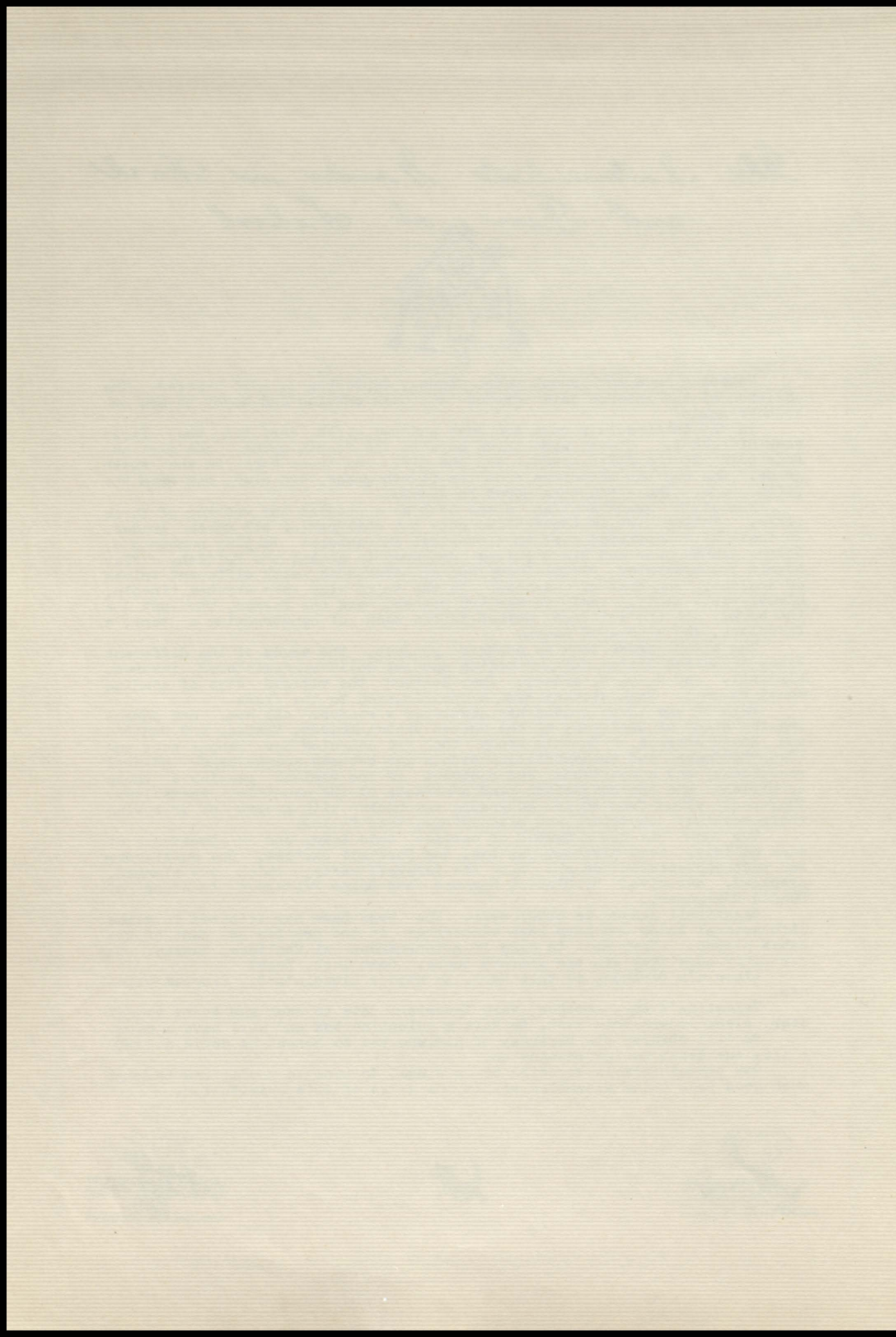
Lincoln's Birthday is this week. We have a Lincoln's Day Program planned.

The third grade assisted by the first and second grades completed a colorful unit on Mexico. They exhibited their art work and presented a program to the P. T. A.

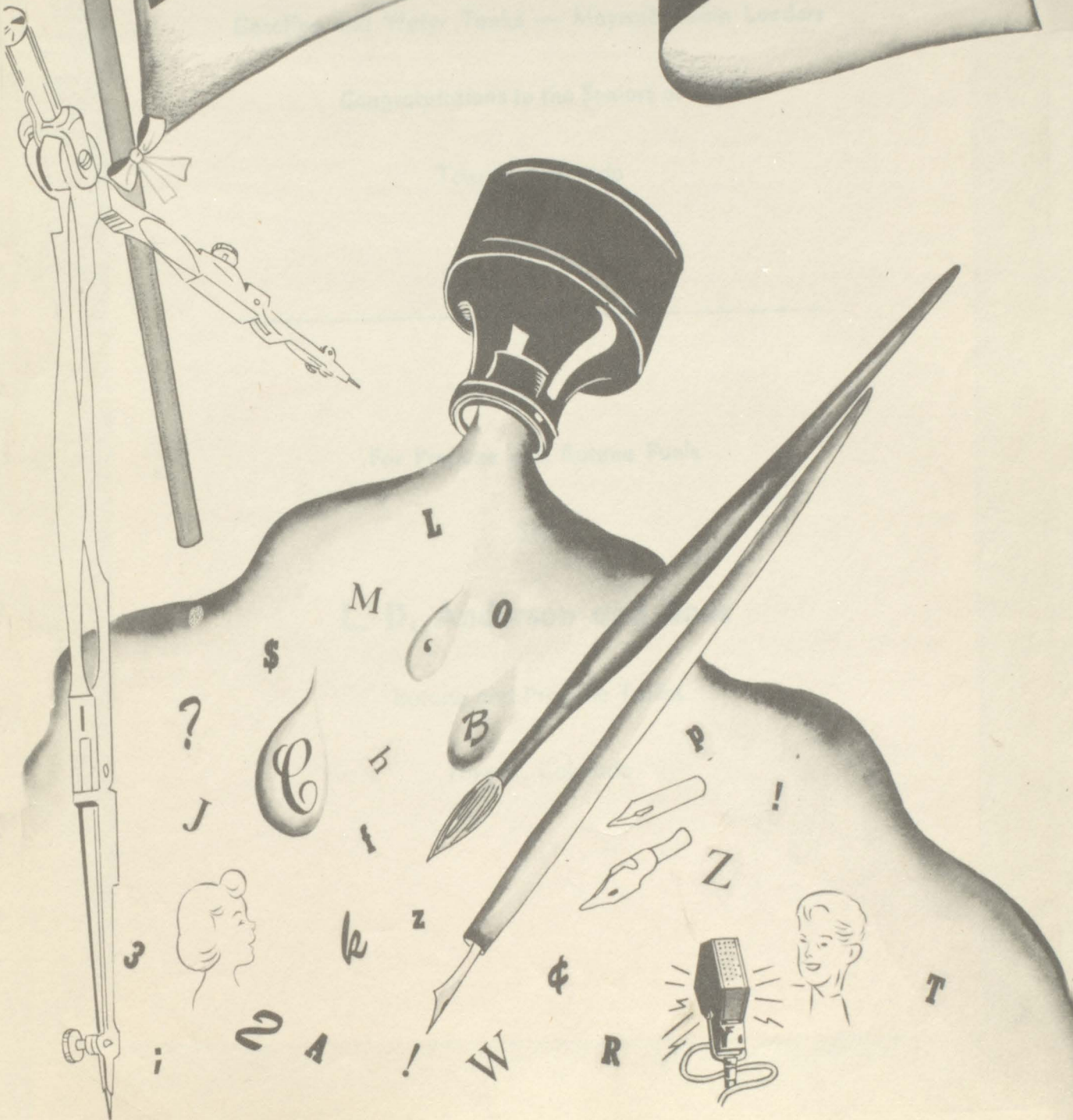
Another very interesting project was a unit on cotton. The life cycle of the cotton plant was studied. A large collection of items made from cotton was displayed on their bulletin board.

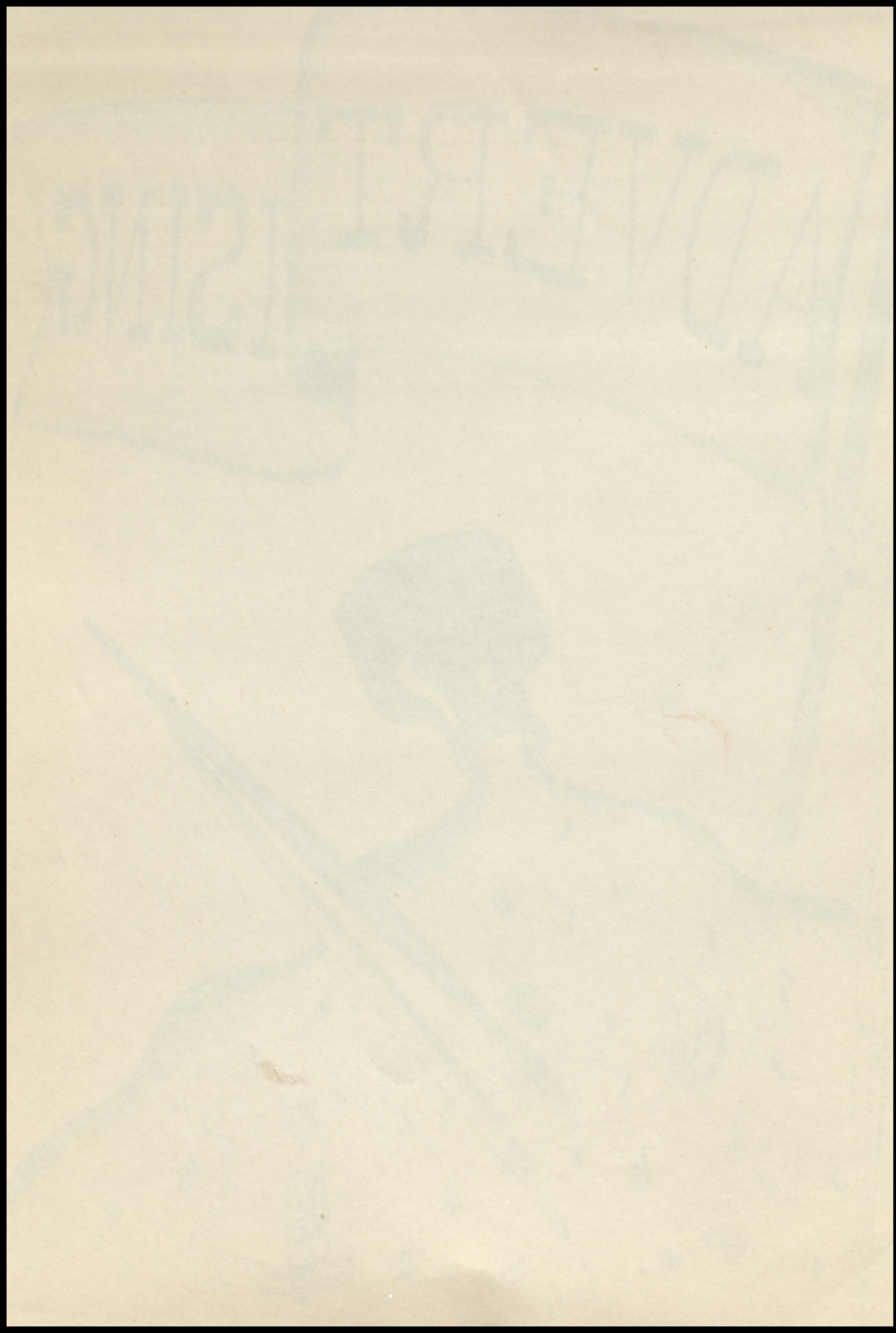
Everyone took part in the candy sale. From this unit they learned to make change, to make candy, and to understand advertising, prices, and estimation and scale.
