
The High School Band has shown definite improvement this year under the direction of Miss Grace Ryan.

The Junior-High class now have four members. They lost Donnie Harper early in the school year.


Geography, spelling, arithmetic, science, reading, and English are the courses that were taught to this class.




In arithmetic, reading, and spelling the basic things were studied.






a lie, the great George Washington.

Our school term is speeding by on wings. We hope to profit and to learn much good from being assembled within the walls of this institution.














