

## Kiowa County Public Library District Survey Results Summary

### Summary of Results

The Kiowa County Public Library District conducted a county-wide community survey September 2019 – December 2019 through SurveyMonkey. Survey topics included the best things about living in the county, challenges facing the county, the best things libraries can do for their community, and interest in new or expanded library services. A sixth question about location (town of respondent's mailing address) was added after 88 responses were already received. A total of 270 people responded to the survey; three-fourths (76%) of the 182 respondents who answered the question about location had a mailing address in Eads. Because additional demographic information was not collected, it is critical not to assume that the survey results represent the greater population that the library serves. However, they are useful as a jumping-off point for further investigation.

In general, the results indicate that the respondents:

- Are relatively satisfied with the services the library is providing;
- Care about their town being safe;
- Value family and community;
- Are concerned about economic issues such as funding for public services and infrastructure, jobs, and housing;
- And are seeking more activities in their communities, particularly educational activities for kids.

The greatest issue currently facing the library is the lack of access for patrons. Their most significant challenges are:

- Accessing the library after hours (4:30pm) and on the weekends;
- Being able to physically get to the library because of how far they live from it;
- And being able to access the building because of physical mobility.

Respondents proposed various ideas to address this problem. These included moving the library, increasing or changing hours, and creating avenues for virtual access to resources.

The survey data also highlighted a prioritization of children within the community:

- Schools were rated the best thing about living in Kiowa County;
- More than half of respondents said there were not enough things to do for children and teens;
- Nearly 80 percent of respondents said libraries should support education and literacy (although this can occur at any age, it is traditionally thought of as K-12);
- And 40% of respondents would like to see a space for children and teens in the library.

However, when asked about things modern libraries do, "offer family events/programs" received the fewest number of votes. This could indicate a lack of awareness about the role libraries can play within their community. Given the positive feedback on the Summer Reading program in the qualitative answers, additional programs for children and teens may be a priority area for expansion. Additional research through focus groups or interviews, and that included non-users, would provide additional information on if this need exists.

## Methodology

The Kiowa County Public Library District conducted a county-wide community survey September 2019 – December 2019 through SurveyMonkey. The survey asked five multiple choice questions and one open-ended question. A sixth multiple choice question about location was added after 88 responses were already received.

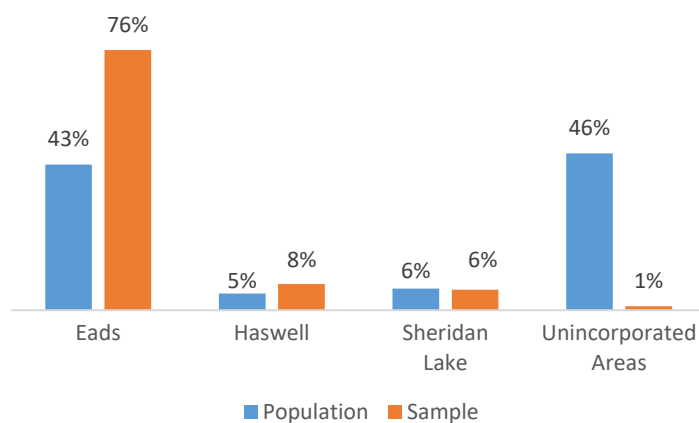
## Demographics

Kiowa County’s 2019 Legal Service Area (LSA) is calculated as 1,373 people. Therefore, the survey sample size of 270 represents nearly 20 percent of the population. However, as the survey did not collect demographic information other than location, we cannot infer that the respondents are representative of the county population. Below is demographic information about the county from [datausa.io](http://datausa.io), which pulls from multiple datasets publicly available.

- Median age: 41.1
- Median household income: \$39,250
- 88 percent are White, 7.02 percent are two or more races, and 4.39 percent are Hispanic or Latinx
- 10.6 percent of the population lives below the poverty line, with the vast majority being females ages 55+. The next largest demographic is males 16-17 years old.
- From 2016 to 2017, employment in Kiowa County declined at a rate of -6.09 percent. The most common employment sectors for individuals who live in Kiowa County are Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting (120 people); Health Care and Social Assistance (117 people); and Educational Services (85 people).
- 93.1 percent of the population have health coverage (although this could have changed since the Affordable Care Act was rescinded). 19.2 percent are on Medicaid and 14.6 percent are on Medicare.

Of the 182 that answered the question, 139 live in Eads (76.37%). However, Eads represents only 42.75 percent of Kiowa County’s LSA. 14 respondents were from Haswell (7.69%), which covers 4.88 percent of Kiowa County’s LSA, and 11 respondents were from Sheridan Lake (6.04%), which covers 6.34 percent of the service area. Finally, 16 respondents were from unincorporated areas including Towner, Arlington,

and Chivington (a combined 1.17% of respondents). The unincorporated areas represent 46.03 percent of Kiowa County’s LSA. The graph shows the disparity in location distribution between the survey sample

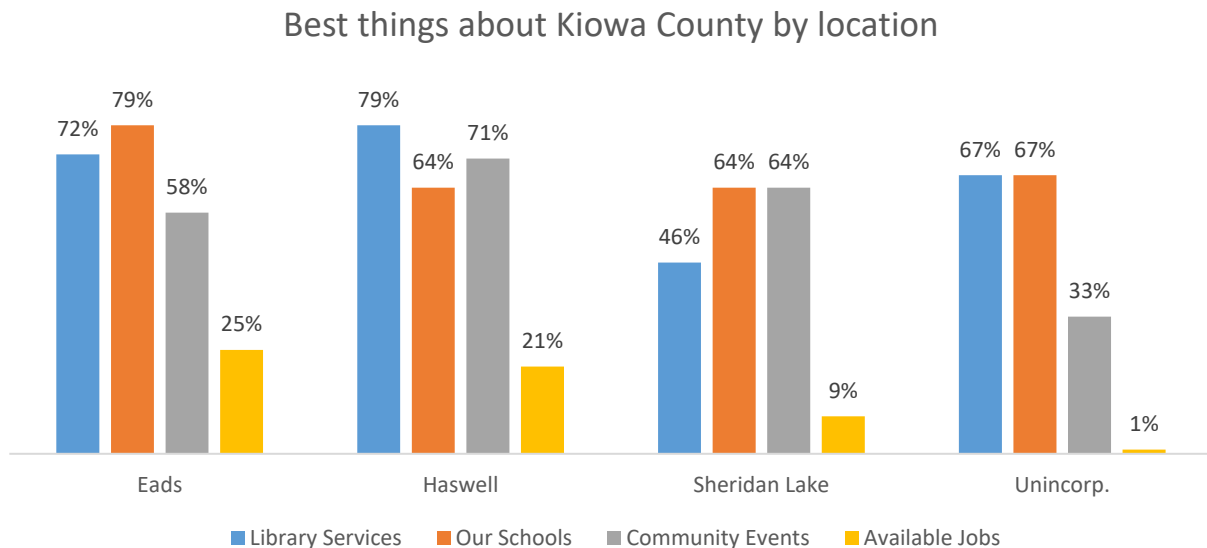
and population. However, it is important to note that the library is located in Eads, meaning more patrons are likely to be located there.

## Results

Key thematic groupings emerged within the data across survey questions. These can help evaluators look deeper into answers to gather information that respondents may not directly indicate. Some major themes were: people/community, access, and economic hardship. Each theme will be discussed further within the context of specific survey questions.

### Question 1: What are the BEST things about living in Kiowa County

For this question, nearly half of respondents (45.6%) chose 7 or more of the choices (out of 11). Without a ranked voting, it's difficult to interpret the priorities of respondents. However, we can perceive that government services are important to Kiowa County residents. Among the highest ranked categories were schools, having a hospital and clinic, and library services. Another key theme was community. "Knowing our neighbors" and "our community pulls together" also ranked highly for this question. In addition, under the "other category" seven respondents wrote in answers dealing with safety, including "small, quiet town" and "local fire, EMS, Sheriff." These responses could also indicate aspects of "community" that respondent's value. Some write-in responses regarding people or family included "all the wonderful people who live here" and "friendly people."



"Library services" ranked fourth in the overall survey, but was #1 in Haswell with 78.6% of respondents choosing that option. It ranked lowest in Sheridan Lake at 45.5%. Other than "library services," the variables in the chart at left were chosen based on their overlap with existing or potential library services (hosting events, helping patrons search for jobs, educational programs, etc).

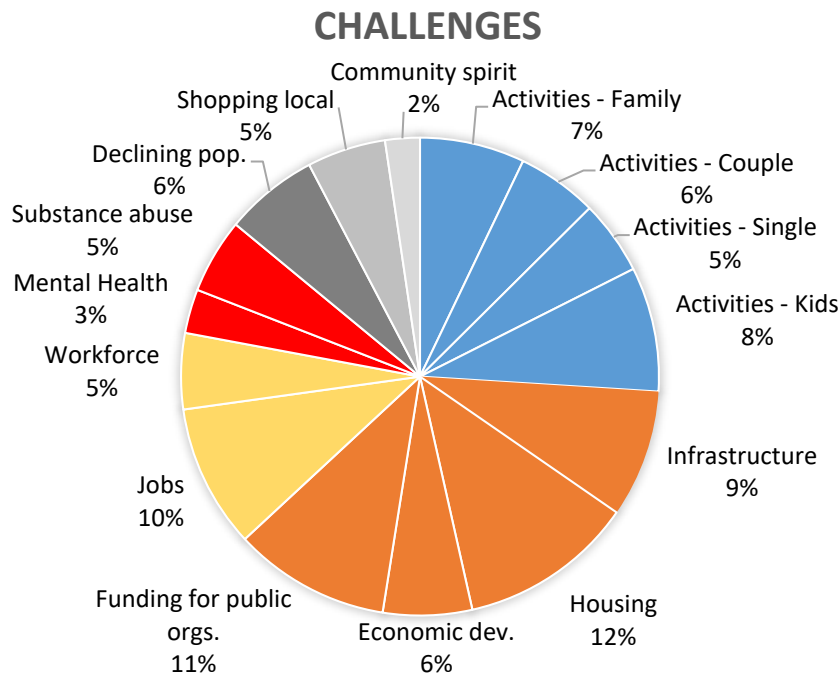
*Question 2: What are the greatest challenges facing the County?*

Overwhelmingly respondents across locations believe housing was the greatest challenge facing Kiowa County (70.8%). In addition to housing, respondents also chose funding for public organizations (63.3%), lack of jobs (58%), and maintaining infrastructure (51.5%). This data highlights a focus on government services and could point to a general dissatisfaction with the municipality or a perception of economic hardship.

However, challenges varied by location. In Haswell, “substance abuse” ranked third overall despite being among the lowest in every other area. Inversely, “declining population” was a major concern for every location except for Eads (ninth out of 15 challenges).

Within the write-in responses, similar issues emerged. Housing was again mentioned multiple times, as well as issues surrounding government services such as “pot holes,” “funding for all things,” “more events at the fairgrounds,” and the “sheriff’s department.”

The chart below compares each challenge to the overall total votes, not the number of people who responded (since respondents could choose more than one option). The chart is also organized into color groups by various themes: blue – activities, orange – public sector, yellow- employment, and red – health. The desire for more activities emerged as an overall challenge, encompassing one-quarter of votes. Public sector issues also took up nearly one-third of votes despite representing 4/15 of the options.



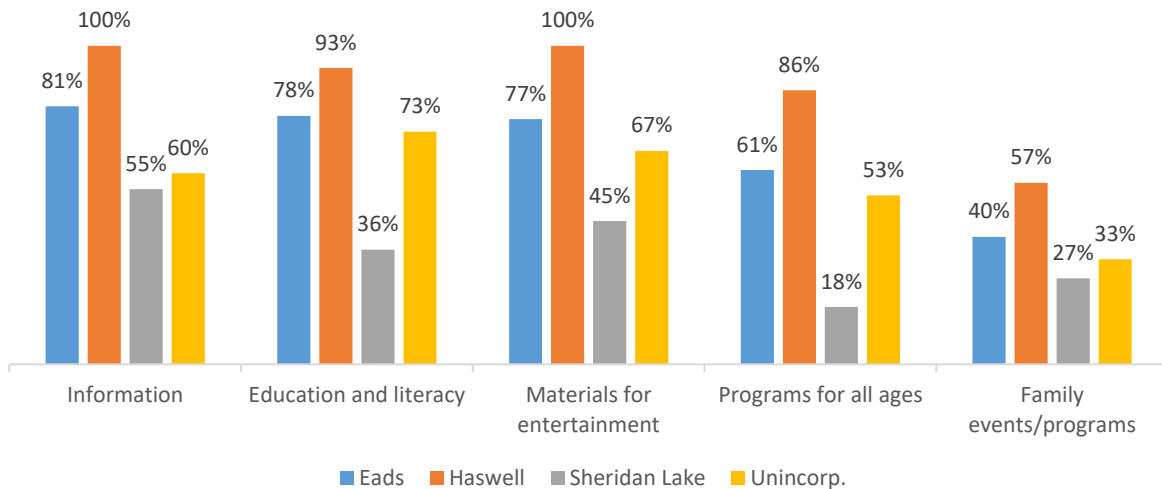
*Question 3: What are the best things modern libraries do for their communities in the 21<sup>st</sup> century?*

Based on the qualitative answers given under the “other” option, there was some confusion regarding the wording of this question. One person answered, “not sure what all the library does,” while another responded, “This is a tough question since we do NOT have a modern library in KC...guessing what things

COULD be done.”Therefore, people could either be answering as what they think the library does best or what is valuable for them personally that the library provides. In addition, they may be thinking of Kiowa County Library or a hypothetical “modern library.”

This question elicited the largest percentage of responses chosen, with respondents choosing an average of 7.6 options out of 12 total choices. However, the result for “Offer family events/programs” (42%) is lower than expected based on responses to other survey questions. This may indicate a lack of awareness about what libraries can provide.

Overall, people think the best things libraries should, could, or currently do are (1) provide information, (2) support education and literacy, and (3) provide materials for entertainment. However, it is possible to infer from the results that respondents believe nearly all of these options are important objectives for a library.

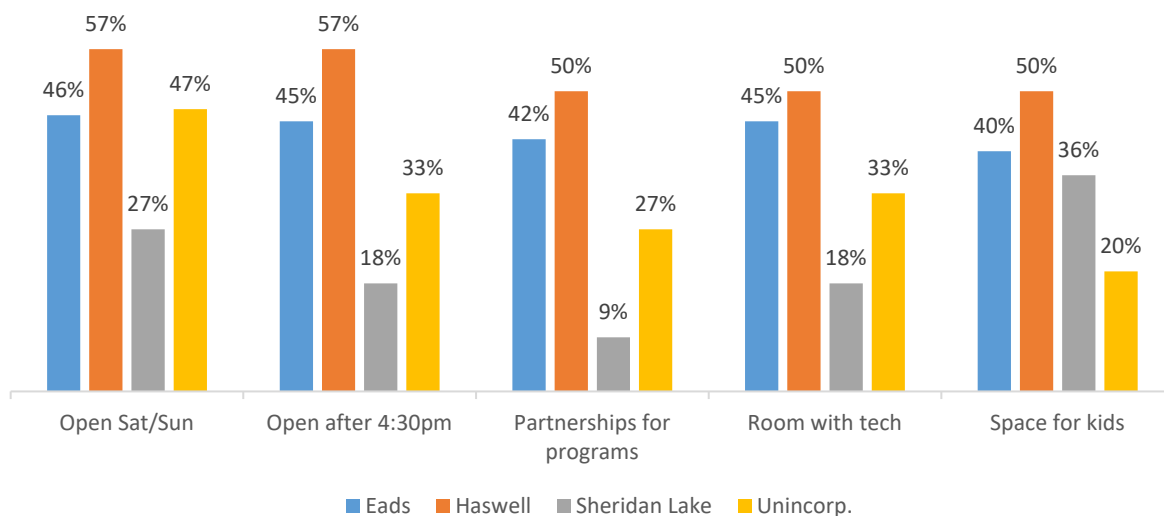
*Question 4: What new or expanded services would you like at the library?*

Results for question 4 centered on a couple of key themes, namely “space,” “access,” and “programming.” Of all the questions, this one elicited the lowest response rate, with an average of 3.6 chosen options out of 10 choices. There was also smaller variation, with an answer choice being chosen by an average of 35.81% of respondents and a standard deviation of 0.10. This could indicate that respondents already believe the library is providing sufficient services.

The unincorporated areas were most interested in “outreach services for all ages in all parts of the county,” while Eads, where the library is located, had a nearly 3-way tie between “open after 4:30 on weekdays,” “open on Saturday and/or Sunday,” and “a free room for community use with projection and conference technology.”

Corresponding to the challenge of not enough activities, 44% of respondents indicated they would like “new partnerships to bring educational and entertainment programs to the county.” This option was chosen most by residents of Eads (42%) and least by residents of Sheridan Lake (9%). Overall, 67 respondents chose both that a challenge was “not enough things to do for kids or teens” and “new partnerships to bring educational and entertainment programs to the community.”

Interestingly, although “lack of jobs” was the third highest ranked challenge, only 20.7% of respondents chose “business support” as a service they would like at the library and only 30 respondents chose both of these options. This could reflect a perception by respondents that there are no jobs in the area, even though they themselves may be employed. Therefore, they might not have a personal need for this service. Further research could investigate whether this is an actual need, although it may benefit people who are not currently accessing the library and/or did not respond to the survey.

Overall, being able to access the library, both physically and at different times, appears important to respondents. Among “other” responses, ones regarding access included, “A ramp! For me accessibility is a REAL problem!” as well as “a virtual library so you can access books via your mobile device.”

*Qualitative data (question 5 results are folded into this section)*

The qualitative data for this question was combined with qualitative data from the previous questions and coded according to whether the excerpt was: (1) best things about Kiowa County, (2) best things about libraries, (3) challenges, or (4) ideas. Excerpts were additionally coded according to recurring themes. Results are organized below first by response type and then by thematic groupings.
